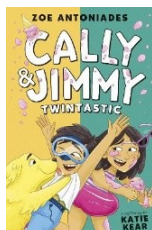


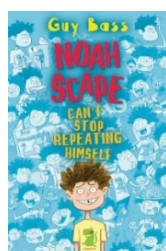
Neurodiversity Book List: LKS2 (7+) *Age ranges are a guide only.

Four separate self-contained stories in each book, each narrated by Cally, as she watches, exasperated, while her minutes-younger brother gets into trouble again and again. She knows Jimmy can't help it really – he has ADHD – and always sticks by him so that things have a habit of working out well in the end.

The Dog That Saved Christmas by Nicola Davies



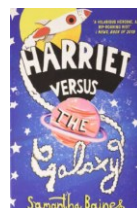

Greta Thunberg by Jina Devika



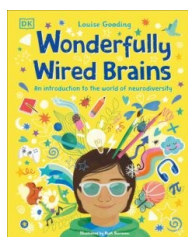

Harriet Versus the Galaxy by Samantha Baines



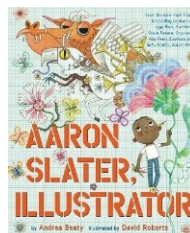
