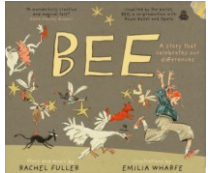
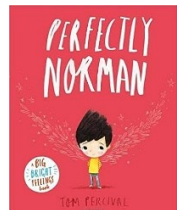
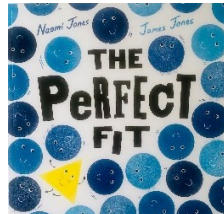
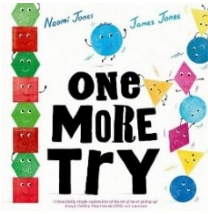
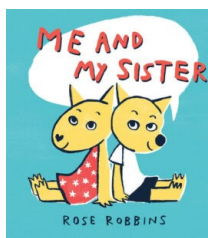
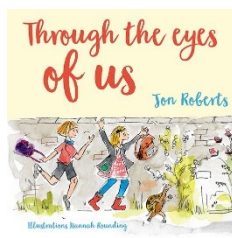
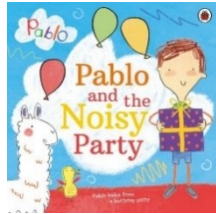


Neurodiversity Book List: KS1 (5+) *Age ranges are a guide only.

All are Welcome by Alexandra Penfold	Bee by Rachel Fuller
 A simple but powerful rhyming picture book that shines a light on the importance of diversity and inclusivity in the classroom	 <i>Bee</i> celebrates difference and the freeing magic that comes of following your own path, rather than trying to fit in. (There is an accompanying soundtrack for this book.)
Leo and the Octopus by Isabelle Marinov	Perfectly Norman by Tom Percival
 Leo experiences the world as bright and loud, and it doesn't always make sense to him. He feels different at school and notices that understanding doesn't always go both ways. (SL)	 Norman's wings are part of who he is. When social pressure leads him to mask them, his story explores identity, acceptance and the freedom of being seen.
The Perfect Fit by Naomi Jones and James Jones	One More Try by Naomi Jones and James Jones
 No matter how hard she tries, Triangle doesn't roll like the circles, or stack like the squares...so she sets off to find friends that look exactly like her. https://youtu.be/97y8kKmOME8	 Circle loves the tower that the squares and hexagons have built and wants to make his own. Me and My Sister by Rose Robbins	Through the Eyes of Us by Jon Roberts
 A celebration of the highs and lows of having a much loved but differently abled sibling. This appealing brother and sister duo spend a lot of their day together, eating meals, going to school and playing. But life with an autistic sibling is not always easy.	 Through the Eyes of Us is a beautiful, colourful picture book for children which gives insight into the world of autism. In this second book, Kya is going to school and has a best friend, Martha, who is also on the autistic spectrum but expresses herself very differently. (SL)
Meesha Makes Friends by Tom Percival	Pablo and the Noisy party by Andrew Brenner
 Meesha loves making things . . . but there's one thing she finds difficult to make - friends. She doesn't know quite what to do, what to say or when to say it.	 Pablo thinks differently! Pablo's mum takes him to his cousin Lorna's birthday party, but Pablo gets scared of the noisy party. (SL)
