
Who are We?

People assume that Tourette's Syndrome (TS) is about swearing or 'bad' behaviour, but the reality is far more complex. Many young people with Tourette's live with motor and vocal tics that are exhausting, painful, and emotionally draining. Misconceptions can lead to isolation and discrimination, making awareness and empathy in our schools vitally important.

Top Tip for Supporting Neurodivergent Learners

SUPPORTING TRANSITIONS

Every neurodivergent pupil's transition journey is different – listen, adapt and involve them in the process. Transition does not just happen on one day. Ensure conversation around preparation for transition is ongoing. An effective activity is for those who know the child well to complete a 'What's great about ...?' page which can be shared in the next class / setting and also used as a self-esteem building tool.
